IN THE FACE OF EVER-GROWING CHALLENGES FOR THOSE IN POVERTY, WE REMAIN DEDICATED TO PROVIDING HIGH-QUALITY SERVICES THAT TRULY TRANSFORM LIVES

Dear Friends,

What began as a simple shelter in southern Utah nine years ago, has evolved into an organization that touches the lives of thousands, now in three counties throughout the state. This last year has brought remarkable growth and expansion of resources, services and initiatives for those in need throughout Washington, Salt Lake and Tooele Counties.

The Switchpoint model has become the heart of each of our communities, offering a safe haven and unwavering support for those facing poverty, food scarcity and homelessness. From our humble beginnings, we've broadened our services to include a food pantry, soup kitchen, job training, long-term housing units, childcare and other vital resources. Our holistic approach is key to empowering individuals and families to break free from cycles of poverty.

There are several standout achievements this year including the opening of The Point Fairpark in Salt Lake City, permanently housing an additional 100 seniors and veterans previously unsheltered. The completion of the Harris Community Village complex in Tooele County is noteworthy as it is the first of its kind in the state of Utah, with an emergency shelter, soup kitchen, 24/7 childcare, and 66 units of deeply affordable, permanent supportive housing.

We took a big leap forward toward our goal of self-sufficiency in launching Switchpoint Coffee Co., adding to our diverse portfolio of businesses, each of which helps us remain sustainable while making a positive impact on the communities we serve.

None of our success is possible without the efforts of mission-driven trustees, dedicated staff, generous donors, supportive state and local officials, and hundreds of invaluable volunteers.

Together, we can continue to create positive outcomes for individuals and families in need, guiding them toward a brighter future.

MILLIONS OF HARD-WORKING AMERICANS LIKE MARIA ARE ONLY ONE MISSED PAYCHECK AWAY FROM HOMELESSNESS



“The thing I love most about Switchpoint is making new friends,” said 11-year-old Matthew. “This is not a problem for him,” his grandmother, Maria added, beaming with pride. It’s true. Everyone at the shelter is buoyed by this social butterfly. When she lost her job, Maria, Matthew, and Matthew’s mother lost their housing due to unpaid rent. Maria is looking for a job, “hopefully at a warehouse,” she says, “because they pay enough to afford rent.”

“Switchpoint has helped us with everything—the job search, food, clothes, shelter—and they’re kind. Once I start working, I want to repay them for all they’ve done for my family.” With her determination, we are confident that will be very soon.

The devastating effects of generational poverty ripple through families creating a shared sense of helplessness and invisibility. In order to break cycles of poverty, these roots must also be addressed. Our clients are treated with dignity and work with trauma-informed, individual case managers who meet them where they are, giving them the tools to begin seeing themselves as worthwhile, meaningful members of their own communities.

Switchpoint understands the journey toward stability and self-sufficiency is not a one-size-fits-all approach. Thus we offer a wide range of supportive services tailored to each individual's unique needs. We are committed to empowering every client with a hand-up, not just a handout. Our ever-evolving list of programs and services is a reflection of our dedication to offering services that will make a genuine impact within our communities.

We provide temporary shelter and permanent housing, access to nutritious meals, and assistance finding stable housing. But it doesn't stop there. We also focus on equipping individuals with the tools and skills to regain their independence. Our job training programs, educational resources, and counseling services help individuals develop the necessary skills and confidence to secure sustainable employment and housing.

DERRICK FIGHTS BACK

MISSING IDENTIFICATION DOCUMENTS LEAVE MANY WITHOUT ACCESS TO VITAL RESOURCES, OFTEN LEADING TO HOMELESSNESS



With his warm smile and relaxed demeanor, you wouldn't guess Derrick was ever a fighter. His time as a professional boxer taught him flexibility and agility which came in handy while coping with adversity. When his aging mother needed care, he relocated to St. George to care for her full-time. Sadly, her condition quickly worsened and she was placed in an assisted living facility leaving Derrick with no job and nowhere to stay.

He came to Switchpoint seeking help with housing and job prospects. With the help of his case manager Stephan, he was able to access vital identification documents needed to apply for monthly social security benefits. He can now pay rent and take care of his health. Best of all, his case manager also arranged for him to move into the same facility as his mother, who is delighted to be reunited with her son. Derrick still has a lot of "fight" in him. He's getting in shape, making friends, and thoroughly enjoying his new life.

SENIOR HOUSING CRISIS

THE GREYING HOMELESS

SWITCHPOINT ORIGINATED WITH RAY, A HOMELESS SENIOR. THE LOSS OF HIS WALLET WAS THE FIRST DOMINO TO FALL AND HE DIDN'T HAVE THE RESOURCES TO PICK UP THE PIECES. RAY'S SITUATION IS NOT UNIQUE. OUR SENIORS NEED OUR ASSISTANCE

Nearly 1 in 5 people in the U.S. without a permanent place to live are 55 and older. This very vulnerable population is one of the fastest-growing groups of people experiencing homelessness. For many of them, it is first-time homelessness.

The average income for our elder clients is just over \$800 a month, making the median rent in Utah of \$1,571 per month far beyond out of reach. It is estimated that 700 senior adults in Utah will become homeless in 2023. The displacement rate this creates is 55% greater than the available affordable housing for these older adults. The only viable solution for our seniors is more deeply affordable housing.

The expanding needs of this vulnerable population are what led to our vision for The Point. The newest in this series of affordable housing for seniors, The Point Fairpark, opened in May 2023 adding an additional 94 units to the 100 units opened in 2022 for our Seniors and Veterans.

HARRIS COMMUNITY VILLAGE

OUR COMMITMENT TO THOSE IN NEED NECESSITATES INNOVATION. THIS BEAUTIFUL COLLABORATIVE EFFORT IS THE FIRST OF ITS KIND IN THE COUNTRY, OFFERING MORE ON-SITE RESOURCES THAN EVER BEFORE IN OUR STATE

Switchpoint discovered the abandoned Harris Elementary School in 2019 and immediately saw potential. The vision of repurposing the school into a 24/7 emergency shelter and resource center was born. The 10-acre parcel would take time to be transformed into a one-of-a-kind complex to address the needs of those living in poverty and homelessness.

In collaboration with the Tooele Housing Authority, the vision finally became a reality!

Harris Community Village is the first of its kind in the country! This transformative initiative integrates a 24/7 emergency shelter resource center with 66 units of permanent supportive housing. Services on-site include:

- 24/7 childcare
- Community soup kitchen
- On-site case management

This strategic approach empowers residents with the tools and resources needed to secure and maintain stable housing, fostering community resilience.

This project was made possible with generous funds from the State of Utah, Tooele County, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and numerous private donations.



DOMINIQUE

30% OF PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BATTLE SERIOUS MENTAL HEALTH CONDITIONS. LACK OF HELP OFTEN LEADS TO ADDICTION



Three weeks after moving into her studio apartment at The Point Redhills, Dominique is feeling hope she hasn't felt in years. "I've turned a corner that feels different. I never have to live with a roommate who could pull me back into a dangerous lifestyle—or worse, live on the streets. It's a game changer," she said.

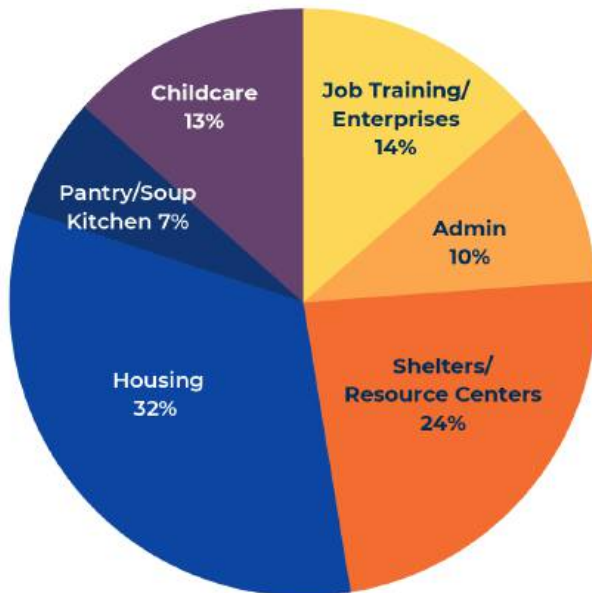
Prolonged, severe trauma in her early 20s left Dominique with complex PTSD. Without the treatment she needed for her mental health condition, she attempted to escape her unrelenting mental distress by self-medicating. Decades of suffering, addiction and chronic homelessness led to further health challenges and barriers to independence. A true survivor of life's hardest struggles, she is optimistic, passionate, and eager to get to work. As she continues to heal, she hopes to help others find the support they need to prevent them from enduring what she has. Dominique has survived the worst, and grown into a wise, resourceful, empathetic human being.

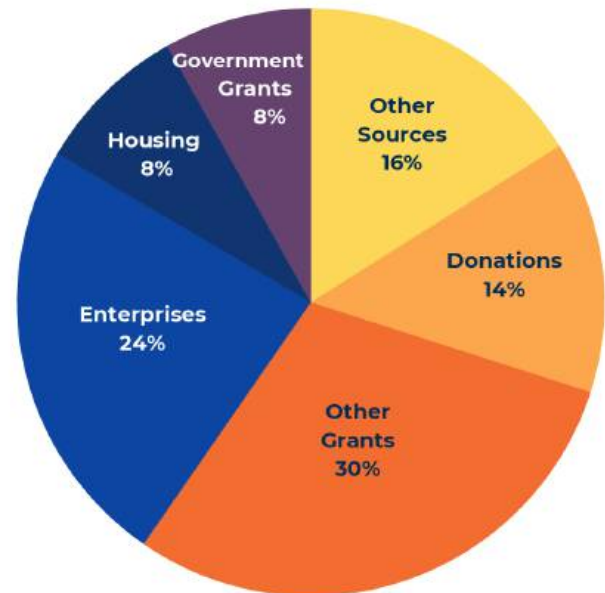

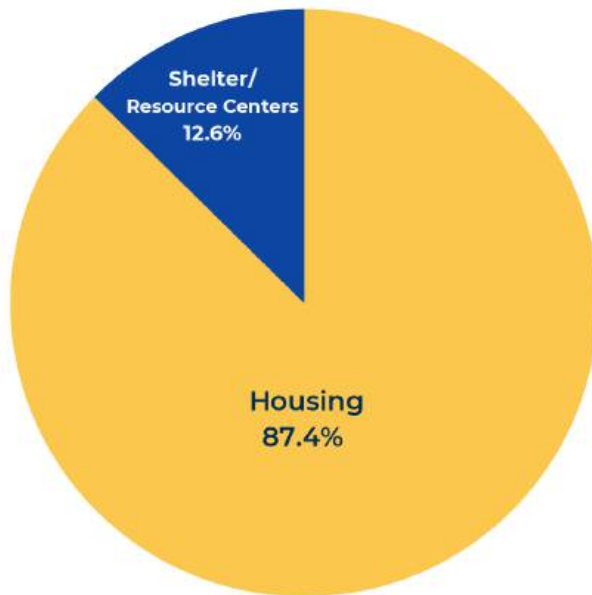

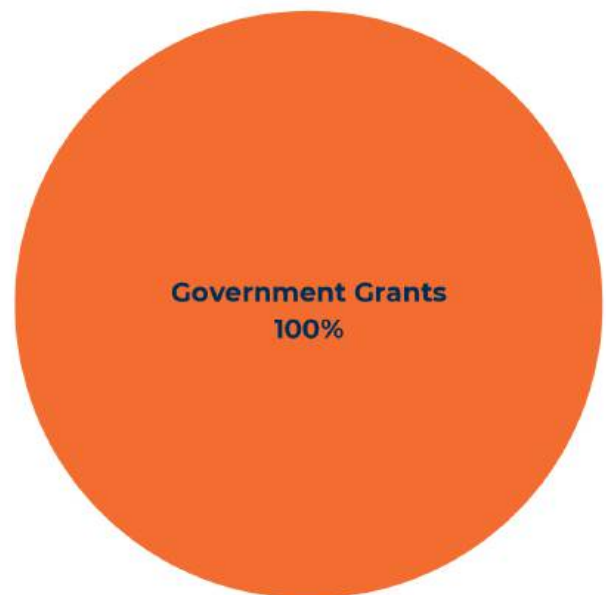

Switchpoint is committed to helping those in need to become self-sufficient and confident in their ability to care for themselves. We believe in our clients and help them feel valued and respected, which is a new experience for many.

Most shelters offer little more than a one-night-at-a-time place to sleep, sending those in need out on their own every morning. Without resources and guidance to make meaningful changes, poverty becomes virtually inescapable. One way we help people regain their power is through job training. This includes job shadowing, beginning with volunteering in exchange for "Switch Bucks" (our own economy). Then, moving into full employment.

Through all of our entities, Switchpoint has created 183 jobs.
